## President's Report: (Best) -

• Discussion on NHAFC committee vacancies (State Interoperability Executive Committee, the Mass Casualty Incident Management Committee, and the Manufactured Housing Standards Board.)

- A few of the BOD members attended the North Country Public Safety Foundation Awards Banquet and Dinner on November 10<sup>th</sup> at the Mount Washington Hotel. This is an annual event that we have attended for serval years. It's always nice to connect with the Fire Chiefs, Law Enforcement, Dispatchers, EMS providers and other Public Safety officials in the North Country and hear the about the awards and recognition for their actions during the previous year.
- Several members of the BOD attend the FMO 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary luncheon on November 14<sup>th</sup>.
- On November 16<sup>th</sup>, I attend a zoom meeting with our legislative representative Adam. The meeting was with the PFFNH and other members of the NH Retirement Coalition. During this meeting the PFFNH discussed some potential legislative changes to the retirement system for the future. These changes were focused on recruitment and retention. ## <sup>1st</sup> Vice President Report (Emanuel) –

- NHAFC LEGISLATIVE UPDATE December 6
- **BILL TITLES** To date, we have identified about 35 bill titles, also known as Legislative Service Requests or "LSRs". Sometime later this month, we can expect to see the actual language of the bills. Currently, only the title and sponsor are public information. Lots of familiar issues including:
- Code Adoption
- • Ambulance Billing
- • Group II Pension Alterations
- The House deadline to file bills has passed. The Senate has until December 19 to file bills for the session. There will likely be around 1100 bills filed. Currently, less than 800 have been made public.
- **ORGANIZATION DAY** The House and Senate will meet on Wednesday, December 7 for Organization Day. At that time, they will elect their respective leaders.
- • Senate –Senator Jeb Bradley (R-Wolfeboro) will become Senate President. Senator Donna Soucy (D-Manchester) will serve as Democratic Leader.
- • House On the House side, the question is how many members attend the session on 12/7. Currently, Republicans hold a 201-198 majority, with one race tied. If all the Republicans show up to vote for Speaker, it is fair to expect current Speaker Sherm Packard (R-Londonderry) will get a second term. If more Democrats show up to the session on 12/7 then Republicans, there is a chance Rep. Matt Wilhelm (D-Manchester) will be elected Speaker. Both parties are

working to push all their members to attend to participate in the very important vote for Speaker.

- Once Organization Day wraps up, we can expect to see information on committee assignments and printing of bills.
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- **POTENTIAL SESSION SCHEDULE** As part of the Senate Organization Day, they have proposed rules creating the schedule for the session. At this point, if the proposed Senate rules are adopted, and the House rules align, there are a few important dates:
- • Opening Day Wednesday, January 4, 2023
- Crossover March 20, 2023 Generally, considered "half time" of the Session. It is the date by which all House bills must "crossover" to the other side, and vice verse.
- • Final Day Thursday, June 29, 2023.
- Once the House rules become clearer, we will work to find a date for a Legislative Breakfast.

**ADMINISTRATION:** 

<u>Personnel:</u>

We currently have 7 full-time vacancies and 4 part-time vacancies. The following openings are those that we are actively recruiting for at this time:

Emily Crosby joined our staff as a Fire Investigator on December 2<sup>nd</sup>. Once she has completed her field training she will be assigned to the Hillsborough County area.

Mary MacCaffrie has announced her retirement as a Public Education Specialist effective December 15<sup>th</sup>. Mary worked with us for about 13 years. We wish her well in her upcoming retirement.

Erica Webb resigned her position as an Administrative Supervisor on December 1<sup>st</sup>. We wish her well in her new position within another state agency.

#### <u>School Safety:</u>

Annual school inspections are required pursuant to RSA 153:14. These inspections are required while school is in session. Please remember to submit a written report to the State Fire Marshal no later than December 15<sup>th</sup>.

#### <u>Board of Fire Control:</u>

The Board of Fire Control and the SFMO staff have started the review of the 2021 editions of NFPA 1 and NFPA 101. The goal is to have a package ready for legislative action in 2024.

The Board of Fire Control has received inquiries on two possible code amendments to the 2018 edition of NFPA 1. A public hearing notice will be posted for a January 18, 2023 at 1:30 pm. The possible amendments are:

- Sprinkler Systems for Fire Stations: Consider aligning the sprinkler system requirement for new fire stations with the State Building Code which would be sprinkler systems are required for fire stations greater than 5,000 square feet.
- Food trucks: Consider removing the requirement of an LP gas system certification

#### Foam Take-back Program:

We continue to work with DES to launch the foam take-back program. Due to contracting and permitting challenges the launch of this program is delayed into 2023. An important consideration in the program is the best and safest disposal methods to destroy the PFAS chemicals. The latest inventory is approximately 9,600 gallons.

#### **BUREAU OF INVESTIGATIONS:**

In the month of November, we received 24 incident notifications resulting in 6 scene responses. The Bureau of Investigations currently has 11 active arson or suspected arson investigations.

#### New/Active cases (synopsis of some of our cases are listed below):

- On November 9, investigators responded to Sugar Hill to investigate a structure fire that had occurred the night before. It appears to have been accidentally caused by an electrical overload although the official classification is undetermined as a result of extensive damage to the area of origin.
- On November 16, investigators responded to Meredith for an untimely death suspected to be from carbon monoxide poisoning. Autopsy results indicate it was a natural death and not from carbon monoxide.
- On November 23, an investigator responded to Charlestown to investigate a structure fire. This was an accidental electrical fire.

#### Fatal Fire/CO Incidents:

• On November 28, investigators responded to New Boston for a suspected accidental carbon monoxide poisoning death. The victim died from CO exposure while working on a lawnmower in a garage.

#### Ignitable Liquid Detection Canine Teams:

Our IGL Canine Teams were deployed two times in the month of November and performed three canine demonstrations.

- On November 10, an IGL K9 team went to Boscawen to assist the Division of Forests and Lands Forest Protection Bureau with the investigation of a wildland fire.
- On November 28, an IGL K9 team went to Hanover to assist with the investigation of a structure fire.

#### Public Outreach:

• One youth firesetter assessment was scheduled during the month of November with three new youth firesetter intakes.

#### Training/Committees:

- Investigators Stephen Dennis and Brynn Dunne completed the Certified Fire Investigator program presented by the NH Fire Academy.
- All BOI personnel completed fall firearms training in November.
- The District Chiefs attended First-Line Supervisor training.
- BOI personnel provided FMO response criteria training to the Medical Examiner's office.

#### **BUREAU OF BUILDING SAFETY & CONSTRUCTION:**

#### <u>State Building Permit System:</u>

We processed 26 building permit applications in the month of November.

#### Technical Assistance, Educational & Healthcare Reviews:

We initiated 8 educational and 3 healthcare plan reviews, completed 82 inspections and 85 technical consults in the month of November.

#### Variance Requests:

We processed 7 variance requests in the month of November.

#### **BUREAU OF OUTREACH & EDUCATION:**

#### <u>Hazardous Materials:</u>

Hazardous Materials response, coordination and consultation is available through the oncall FMO

supervisor. Our Hazardous Materials Coordinator is available for PEAC Software training for fire

departments. PEAC is used for documentation of Tier II facilities and chemical storage.

Our Hazardous Materials Coordinator attended the monthly training on PEAC software and worked with HSEM

on the State Threat & Hazard Identification & Risk Assessment (THIRA). A training was provided to the Seacoast Regional Haz Mat Team on the State's Unknown Substance Protocol. Our Hazardous Materials Coordinator continued to work with the Regional Haz Mat Teams on planning a Wide Area Air Monitoring Exercise for the spring of 2023.

A SERC meeting was held in November, the bylaws where finalized and accepted.

Further discussions and work is ongoing to evaluate the hazmat problem and funding sources.

#### Swiftwater Rescue Working Group:

Further discussions and work is ongoing to evaluate the swiftwater problem and funding sources.

#### Regional Outreach/Chief's Roundtables:

We continue to partner with the Commissioner's Office, Director Cutting and the NHAFC to conduct regional outreach/Chief's Roundtables.

We continue to work with the team at the Fire Academy as departments implement the NHESR program, available free of charge, for incident reporting. If you are interested in giving a presentation on the program or would like to request one, please email <u>NHESR@dos.nh.gov</u>.

We are monitoring changes proposed by the USFA to the NFIRS system. We understand a substantial redo of the system as we know it is in the works. We anticipate more details will be available in late spring 2023.

#### Training Opportunities:

On November 9, 2022, we offered an *Inspection Essentials: Part II* class at the Wilton Fire Department from 6:30-9:00PM. This session was a continuation of Part 1, as well as exploring frequently asked questions and common violations encountered in NFPA 101.

On November 15 and 16, 2022, we offered four sessions of *NFPA 1 & 101: 2018 Edition Updates.* We held a day and evening session at the NHFA and a day and evening session at the Raymond Burton Training Facility in Bethlehem. The seminar provided attendees with an overview of the changes, updates, removals and additions to NFPA 1 and NFPA 101 from the 2015 to 2018 editions of the codes. We are happy to report that all sessions were well attended, and over 120 personnel received the training!

Additional programs are in the works, and we anticipate additional trainings beginning again in early 2023. ## Fire Standards/Training/EMS – (Director Cutting)

Director Cutting was unavailable for the meeting but submitted his report in writing. Bureau Chief Romanello highlighted several areas of the report

ADMINISTRATION Personnel Kelly Teeboom has been hired as our full-time position for an Administrative Supervisor position for the Program Support Unit.

□ We conducted interviews scheduled for our two open full-time Fire Service Instructor Supervisor (Captain)

positions.

☐ Additional interviews are planned for our open Curriculum Administrator position. ☐ One full-time EMS Training Coordinator in Bethlehem position is open and we are seeking applicants.

□ Our part-time Program Coordinator position for the Fire Officer program is open and we are seeking applicants.

Grants

□ We continue to work with the architectural firm on the design process for the Raymond S. Burton Fire and EMS

Training Facility project.

- Our estimated timeline to begin construction is the spring of 2023.

- We are working with all parties to overcome the challenge of significant price increases in construction

costs over the last year.

□ We are working through the approval process to accept the 2021 AFG grant and the 2021 Homeland Security grants.

□ All grant funded Technical Rescue and EMS in the Warm Zone training programs that are eligible for overtime and

backfill will require us to change our registration process, more specifically closing registration earlier than we have

historically so we can process all necessary paperwork. Grants agreements now need to be in place with local

agencies prior to the training program and will require approval from Governor and the Executive Council to be

reimbursed.

Fire Standards and Training Commission / Curriculum

□ The next Fire Standards and Training Commission meeting will be January 5 th at 0930 in Classrooms 5/6 in the

dormitory building at the main campus. The full schedule for 2023 also includes meetings on March 2 nd , May 4 th ,

September 7 th and November 2 nd .

- The Visiting Committee's for the development of a Fire Officer III & amp; IV program and the Technical

Rescue Program – Rope Operations and Technician continue their work. The second Technical Rescue

Visiting Committee was held on December 7 th . The Fire Officer III/IV Visiting Committee has reviewed

other state programs and are now reviewing available textbooks.

 $\Box$  Fire 602 requires that each fire department supply the Commission with a current roster of all fire service

personnel by December 31 st of each calendar year. This can be accomplished using RespondNH.

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Special Projects

□ \$2,535,030 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds were approved for the New Hampshire Emergency

Medical Technician Training Program. This program will assist in recruiting, training and retaining EMS

providers, and assist licensed NH EMS Units in the delivery of emergency, nonemergency transportation and

emergency response services to the people of New Hampshire. We will be working with New Hampshire

Employment Security on developing the specifics of this program and will announce those details as soon as they

are available.

 $\Box$  We are planning to upgrade the current Online Learning Academy to a new platform. This upgrade is scheduled

for January 1, 2023.

□ We have implemented a new Wi-Fi system at the fire academy which will allow guests to self-register for their

own accounts.

□ We continue our work in partnership with the Police Academy to develop a more comprehensive program for

PTSD training utilizing experts from this field in development of the curriculum. Outreach

□ We are continuing our Leadership Roundtables with the Commissioner, Fire Marshal's Office and regional Fire

## Homeland Security and Emergency Management – (Dir. Buxton)

In early 2023, we will be coordinating regional meetings with our local partners to make sure we are aligned with your expectations.

As we announced during last month's local partners call, we are working to redevelop our field representative service program and look to bring this back the first quarter of 2023.

December 15, 2022 at 12:00 will be our next Local EMD call. This month's call will include an update on the Seabrook Station program.

Below you will find a brief list of events that has taken place over the last month:

- We are actively working to address staffing shortages within HSEM. A working group has been established to work specifically on our recruitment and retention program.
- We have collaborated with NH Ed to review and award \$13 million dollars in SAFE grants. This includes 512 projects at 341 schools. Projects include the hardening of the school entry points. It is imperative that you communicate with your school when the projects are completed.
- > We continue to collect School Emergency Operations Plans (SEOP).
- > We continue to conduct and develop school security plans.
- > As of today we are managing 7 separate disaster relief programs;
  - DR 4329 July 2017 Floods
  - DR 4355 October 2017 Severe Storms and Flooding
  - DR 4370 March 2018 Severe Storms and Flooding
  - DR 4457 July 2019 Severe Storms and Flooding
  - DR 4516 COVID
  - DR 4622 July 2021 Severe Storms and Flooding
  - DR 4624 July/August 2021 Severe Storms and Flooding
- ➢ Upcoming deadline submission of December 31, 2022 for 100% federal reimbursement for COVID; to date we have processed over \$160 million dollars in recovery monies.
- Opened conversation with the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard regarding some longterm exercise efforts.
- Please be tracking your local hazard mitigation plan. We are anticipating a very busy year with over 80 communities entering the planning process.
